#### STRENGTH:

- Our college offers Honours and General Courses in the UG level in as many as 20 subjects and PG course in Bengali, thus catering to the diverse academic choices of the students.
- A strong focus on quality teaching with the help of modern teaching aids.
- Cultural inclinations appreciated and promoted.
- Regular Faculty meetings for better monitoring of the students.
- We have an active NSS cell which regularly organizes various social awareness programme such as health and environment protection for the benefit of locality. some important programme organized by them include blood donation, thalassemia screening for our students, plantation of saplings in our college campus, organizing seminars and special lectures promoting value education and self development.
- We have very efficient administrative machinery for the benefit of our first generation learners fulfilling their teaching learning desire for their improvement.
- College provides different types of financial assistance to needy students by offering fee concession, student's aid fund and additional library facility.

#### WEAKNESS

- Majority of our students come from economically poor sections of the society. They cannot afford our education system with the limited resources academically and financially.
- The socio economic background of our students admitted in the college is responsible for poor communication skills in English.
- We don't have sufficient number of faculty in some department as per need of the student.
- Most of the students admitted in our college are generally lack in nutrition which results in low physical and mental fitness.
- A large number of our students work for their families beyond college hours.

### OPPORTUNITY:

- The main objective of the college is to fulfil the desire of the locality as well as society at large.
- Our present governing body feels it necessary to introduce new courses for UG and PG level as well as in Vocational stream to make teaching learning process affordable and student friendly.
- We have a number of rich humanities courses but we need to develop more science streams at both general and honours level so that scientific desire and aspirations of our students can be satisfied for the benefit of their family and the society at large.

### CHALLENGE:

- Students from rural areas have to compete with students from colleges located in urban areas
- Teaching communication in English to students who come primarily from a lower-middle class section of the society and who are mostly first generation learners.
- Departments consistently cope with insufficient number of teachers and supporting staff.

#### Academic session 2014-15

Students' Feedback (major findings):

- i. About 80% of the students feel satisfied and ranked the overall college environment as "Very good and good".
- ii. The percentage of satisfaction is more than 85% in case of academic environment.
- iii. In Science subjects, about 70% students expressed their views as "Very good and good" with regard to the timeliness of practical classes and laboratory facilities.
- iv. Majority of the students expressed their views as "Very good and good" for cooperation received from the Students' Union specifically in terms of financial aid and encouragement for joining extension programmes.
- v. Students, through their feedbacks, have voiced their demand for better canteen and toilet facilities, which is already in the process of improvement.



#### ALUMNI FEEDBACK [Annexure – (iii)]

#### Alumni Feedback (major findings):

The Institute has an Alumni Association, which plays a major role in the overall development of the college. Besides, every department has their individual alumni. The alumni organize regular meetings with specific agenda. Some of the major views and activities of the Alumni members are as follows-

- 1. A large number of Alumni members have expressed their willingness to take initiative in different kinds of academic and social activities for the all-round development of the Institute.
- 2. Some of the Alumni members have made proposals that they would like to extend financial support for financially poor but meritorious students of the college.
- 3. About 90% of the Alumni members feel that this Institute has great potentiality for teaching and research capabilities and opined that the library, laboratory and computer facilities of the college are ever expanding.
- 4. They expressed their views that the relationship between students, teachers and non-teaching staff is very cordial.
- 5. In the last Alumni meet of the Department of English, (10.07.2015) an alumni member has voluntarily proposed to offer private tuition to the needy, yet meritorious students of the departments, forgoing his remuneration.
- 6. Alumni members of the Institute have organized activities like blood donation, tree plantation, health awareness programmes on obesity, cancer etc. in collaboration with the college.
- 7. Alumni members are regularly invited in the various activities of the Science Forum.

### PARENTS FEEDBACK (MAJOR FINDINGS) [(Annexure – (iv)]

#### Parents Feedback (Major findings)

The Institute has regular contact with the guardians of the students, one of its major stakeholders. Each department has organized a regular Parents-Teachers meeting and seek parents' feedback for overall development of the institute. Some of the major opinions are given below:

- 1. About 80% parents (of Honours students) have given their views as "Very Good" regarding the environment of the Institute.
- 2. Majority of the parents feel that the Institute is expanding its infrastructural facilities in a good pace.
- 3. Parents feel that teachers of the institute are very cooperative not only in serving their academic duties but also in encouraging their children to join various extension programmes taken up by the college.
- 4. Majority of the parents have praised the initiative of the college to organize such meetings because it provides them with a platform to express their views regarding the teaching-learning process followed by the department.

The parents have assured the college authority that they would take adequate care to ensure 75% students' attendance in class and would maintain regular contact with the faculties of the departments in connection to their ward's performance.
