1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

Our college has maintained a well planned curriculum delivery system. This includes three major axes for execution, like - Routine (online and off line), Academic Calendar and Modular distribution of syllabus. 1. Routine: Weekly class routine is a basic need of any academic institution to accommodate various academic parameters. Our institution sincerely cater all the requirements of the stakeholders by creating a well-knit routine both for online classes in pandemic period as well as off line classes on a regular basis. Its primary focal points are a) session wise regular up gradation, b) planning a master routine to avoid the overlap between different subjects and allocation of rooms which helps to avoid confusion among both the teachers and

students. C) sharing the routine with all the departments to include their discretion, d) teachers allocation of different classes are done by the departments only, e) the routines are distributed among teachers and students (in their whatsapp groups - during lockdown period), also uploaded in website and student's notice board (before lockdown period) well ahead of the session which helps to maintain an uninterrupted pace in academics. 2. Academic calendar: It is an organized planner for the entire academic year. It includes the detailed list of continuous internal assessment, selection tests, session breaks and vacation. It helps both the teachers and students to plan their schedule well ahead. Academic calendar gets uploaded in our college website every year. Students also get this in their admission prospectus. So it is well circulated. 3. Modular distribution of syllabus: it is another important axis of academic planning and flawless execution of the entire curriculum. In the beginning of each semester individual department distributes their entire syllabus in hour based modules and all these modules are distributed among the teachers according to their expertise and convenience and direct an explicit goal of the completion of the syllabus. The copies of academic calendars are distributed among the students. Such planning definitely provides a student to balance academic life.

Feedback Obtained

Feedback of the students in 2019-20 25 students are selected on random basis as a sample study. In this feedback survey the sample size is 738 The entire feedback analysis is based on following parameters. 83 students have marked high on the distribution and quality of teaching learning material. 62 students rated high on regularity of classes. 73 students have given response on lesson plan while others don't have any idea of that. 87 students followed modular distribution of syllabus.(in online mode after lockdown all these were posted in various virtual groups including college website www.mdmbirati.org) 91 students follow soft copies of material. (Both honours and general students) .Many students (23) reported difficulty in e material because of high printing cost and unavailability of smart phone or Internet connection. 84 students' rated high regarding interaction with the administration for academic purpose. Regarding interaction with faculty, 59 rated high and 31 rated in average and rest have little or no interaction with the faculty. (Problems of internet connection is evident here) 91 students stressed on the importance of official college based evaluation and specifically university examination. Through internal evaluation they assess their preparation for final examination. 95 accepted that academic calendar helped them to plan their schedules. 35 students have information that college has a grievance cell. The college was closed for covid 19 and thereby the activities of this cell went down. Finally students are asked about their views on the availability of the facilities in the college. Our college has been offering a well organised 'Mentoring System' to facilitate student welfare. The total number of enrolled students are divided in small groups of 15-20 and assigned to a particular faculty at the commencement of their academic programme. The faculty acts as the mentor, someone who serves as a guide throughout the duration of their course in our college. The mentors are always willing to help the students in balancing professional and personal life which builds a strong interpersonal relationship between the teachers and students. The various aspects of our mentorship program are as follows. The students can get in touch with the mentor in any moment without any hesitation which provides the student a strong support system to sail through the college life. The mentor keeps on monitoring the progress of every student under his/her supervision. He organises weekly mock tests and doubt clearing classes for betterment of the students. Since all of the students do not have the equal capability to gather knowledge, our mentors arrange additional classes for slow learners where the learning difficulties of the students are addressed and resolved. Mentors guide the students to take up Add-on courses, participate in seminars/workshops, publications in wall magazines and college journals courses for an exposure to diverse academic and professional perspectives. In addition to that, exhibitions, field trips, industrial visits are organised to enhance the acquaintance of the students. Mentorship programs also provide students with resources and networking opportunities regarding their career options. Mentors also guide the students by helping them to develop interpersonal skills, manage time, relieve stress and offer psychological support in case of any mental crisis. Student feedbacks are always received with an open mind. Parent-mentor meetings are organised quarterly basis to address the issues of the students and any feedback from the guardian community. Special care is taken for cases of single parenting, financial and other health issues of the family.

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2.5.2 – Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

The College, being affiliated to the West Bengal State University, is obliged to implement all directives of the university regarding continuous internal evaluation. These include the system of conducting regular class tests, examinations in the form of quiz, power point and oral presentations on various topics related to the academic syllabus and also contemporary research relevant to their curriculum. The College, being affiliated to the West Bengal State University, is obliged to implement all directives of the university regarding continuous internal evaluation. These include the system of conducting regular class tests, examinations in the form of quiz, power point and oral presentations on various topics related to the academic syllabus and also contemporary research relevant to their curriculum. Apart from tests, the students are also evaluated based on their daily class activities like group discussions, debates, assignments etc. In subjects like physics, chemistry and life science-oriented disciplines like botany, zoology, microbiology and anthropology, continuous evaluation of the laboratory skills and analytical abilities are made during the practical classes. The College adheres to the factor of student attendance in all assessments, which serves as an incentive for regularity and academic discipline. The schedule for Class Tests/Assignments is notified to the students in advance. Each department has a Monitoring Committee that verifies the internal assessment data of the students before it is put for display for the students to check. Discrepancies or grievances of the students, if any, are assessed and resolved by departments

before finally putting it forward. Students are always encouraged to attend various academic seminars and workshops and they are assessed based on their feedback regarding their ability to grasp the broad theme of the event that they attended. The provision of Student Feedback facilitates effective implementation of transparent evaluation processes. Internal Assessment Data is available for all stakeholders.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

Academic Calendar serves as an information source and planning document for students, faculty, staff and departments. Every year academic calendar is prepared. The academic calendar is very useful guide to the college. It is a compilation of important events to be conducted during the academic year. It consists of dates of admission, commencement of classes, various examinations, parent-teacher meet, etc. The departments are advised to prepare a comprehensive academic calendar which act as a helping tool both for the students and the teachers to plan and execute departmental activities properly. As the CBCS system was included in the college from the academic year 2018-19, the academic calendar for the year 2019-20 incorporates both semester system as well as 111 system. The calendar was distributed among all the stakeholders through notice board and was also uploaded and shown on the College website. Due to Covid-19 pandemic the original academic calendar could not be adhered to. Regular classes and examination were conducted online in according to new schedule. The same was communicated to students through various online modes, such as Google Classroom, Whatsapp group and over the phone.

Maintenance of equipment and proper up-gradation of various facilities contribute to a smooth running infrastructure in an institution. In this institute these all are formally instituted. Various procedures and policies are employed, tender is called and competent authority is appointed for the regular repair and upkeep of various facilities. The institution also maintains proper AMC for the purpose. Academic facilities are taken care of. Four e-classrooms have been set up and are under constant vigilance. In every classroom, new white boards and marker pens have replaced the old blackboards, chalk and dusters. A variety of measures have been taken by Departments like Physics, Computer Science, Chemistry, Anthropology, Zoology, Botany and Geography in order to ensure calibration and precision in the measures of equipments and instruments required in the laboratories of the respective Departments. The maintenance of the computers is done annually. New software downloaded and the machines are formatted to their latest versions, as and when required. There is a regular inspection of the expiry dates of all the chemical reagents, of whether there is any fungal growth in the human bones and specimens, of the level of preservative materials. Necessary steps are taken when and where required. In addition to this, power distribution panel, generator and water pump have also been installed for the smooth running of the

college. As a campus accommodating the sports arena, the gymnasium, and also an adjoining field, sports and gym equipment are regularly bought, updated and maintained. Professionally trained instructors are employed in the gymnasium. At the beginning of each Academic Session, the Library Advisory Committee in consultation with all Departmental Heads prepare a list of latest books and journals to be accommodated. Quotations are invited from reliable suppliers and order is placed on the basis of lowest quoted rates. The library is spacious, well-arranged and well equipped with a Xerox machine, a printer, CCTV cameras for vigilance, five desktop computers with active internet connection. It also has a digitally organized Catalogue. These are regularly checked, updated and repaired to facilitate their full functioning. Access to e-journals INFLIBNET-NLIST is renewed annually. Latest question papers, employment weekly, etc. are archived religiously throughout the year. Each Department has its own library which is regularly updated. These procedures facilitated a smooth running of the college.
