
# 5. Student Support and Progression

### STRENGTH:

- Our college offers Honours and General Courses in the UG level in as many as 20 subjects and PG course in Bengali, thus catering to the diverse academic choices of the students.
- A strong focus on quality teaching with the help of modern teaching aids.
- Cultural inclinations appreciated and promoted.
- Regular Faculty meetings for better monitoring of the students.
- We have an active NSS cell which regularly organizes various social awareness programme such as health and environment protection for the benefit of locality. some important programme organized by them include blood donation, thalassemia screening for our students, plantation of saplings in our college campus, organizing seminars and special lectures promoting value education and self development.
- We have very efficient administrative machinery for the benefit of our first generation learners fulfilling their teaching learning desire for their improvement.
- College provides different types of financial assistance to needy students by offering fee concession, student's aid fund and additional library facility.

#### WEAKNESS

- Majority of our students come from economically poor sections of the society. They cannot afford our education system with the limited resources academically and financially.
- The socio economic background of our students admitted in the college is responsible for poor communication skills in English.
- We don't have sufficient number of faculty in some department as per need of the student.
- Most of the students admitted in our college are generally lack in nutrition which results in low physical and mental fitness.
- A large number of our students work for their families beyond college hours.

# OPPORTUNITY:

- The main objective of the college is to fulfil the desire of the locality as well as society at large.
- Our present governing body feels it necessary to introduce new courses for UG and PG level as well as in Vocational stream to make teaching learning process affordable and student friendly.
- We have a number of rich humanities courses but we need to develop more science streams at both general and honours level so that scientific desire and aspirations of our students can be satisfied for the benefit of their family and the society at large.

# CHALLENGE:

- Students from rural areas have to compete with students from colleges located in urban areas
- Teaching communication in English to students who come primarily from a lower-middle class section of the society and who are mostly first generation learners.
- Departments consistently cope with insufficient number of teachers and supporting staff.
- Time frame allotted for completing Part III syllabus is short.

### [Annexure – (ii)]ANALYSIS OF FEEDBACK in Academic session 2015-16

#### Students' Feedback (major findings):

- i. About 86% of the students felt satisfied with the college facilities and ranked the overall college environment as "Very good" and "Good", which is 6% higher compared to previous year survey (2014-15)
- ii. More than 90% students feel pleased regarding the overall academic atmosphere of the college.
- iii. In Science subjects, due to the enhancement of laboratory equipments in this academic session, about 80% students expressed their views as "Very good" and "Good". However, more facilities would be needed in the coming sessions. Students also benefitted due to the opening of Honours course in Chemistry.
- iv. Besides financial aid and encouragement for joining extension programmes, the member of the Students' Union took an active role in the General counselling process of the institute for academic betterment and as a result, majority of the students expressed their views as "Very good" and "Good" regarding the performance of the students' body.
- v. On the basis of last year feedback, canteen as well as toilets of the institute were renovated and thus the students felt very much satisfied. However, continuous monitoring is needed for further improvement.

#### Alumni Feedback (major findings):

Some of the major views and activities of the Alumni members were as follows:

- 1. Alumni members of the college have published a wall magazine regarding their current activities in the college.
- 2. The core members of the Alumni took an active role in enhancing the number of alumni members in this academic year by taking the help of social media.
- 3. New Alumni Committee was formed in this current session.
- 4. Alumni members agreed to participate actively in the 2<sup>nd</sup> cycle of NAAC visit of the college.
- 5. Alumni members of the Institute organized activities like blood donation, tree plantation for the second time, health awareness programmes, cancer etc. in collaboration with the college NSS unit.
- 6. Like previous year, alumni members were invited to participate in the various activities of the Science Forum

#### Parents Feedback (Major findings) :

Like previous year, each department has organized a regular Parents-Teachers meeting on the basis of the published academic calendar at the beginning of the session and seek parents' feedback for overall development of the institute. Some of the major opinions are given below:

- 1. Almost all parents of the Honours students feel satisfied regarding regular Parents'-Teachers interaction throughout the academic session and also agreed that the quality of academic performances had been enhanced through these interactions in all departments.
- 2. All parents agreed that their wards would not be given permission by the college authority to appear for their final examination unless they had secured satisfactory marks in the annual test.
- 3. They felt very happy to see the expanding the infrastructural facilities of the institute in a sustainable way.
- 4. The parents praised the initiative of the college to organize such meetings and hoped that individual counselling sessions would also be organized if required.
- 5. Lastly, like previous year, the parents assured the college authority that they would try to ensure the regular attendance of their wards. In case of long illness or frequent absenteeism of their children they agreed to formally inform the college authority about the same, so that the college could arrange special classes for these students.
- 6. Like the alumni, parents were also enthusiastic to participate actively in the 2<sup>nd</sup> cycle of NAAC especially during the Peer Team visit.
